Members can, and are actively encouraged, to exhibit in the Summer and Autumn Shows and in addition there are several Talks and Trips organized for our members and their guests to enjoy.

#### **HHS Trading Shed Sundays 9:30am to 12 noon**

The HHS Trading Shed is located on the allotments adjoining the garages in Birkbeck Road, Hutton. Access is gained by using the entrance adjoining 1-3 Birkbeck Road. PLEASE NOTE: members vehicles can be driven down this access road to collect bulk items.

Only Members of HHS and Affiliated clubs who have paid their membership fees can enjoy the benefits available and only on the production of their Membership Card. The Trading Shed is open every Sunday morning between February and December and on selective weekends as published in the monthly Bulletin.

#### **Exhibitors Rules**

1. Competitors in ALL sections, is open to all full members of the Society who were enrolled at least one month before the date of the show.

- 1a Entries will also be accepted in ALL SECTIONS from affiliated club exhibitors. In accordance with General Data Protection Regulation 2018.
- 2. The number of entries per exhibitor is <u>restricted to three</u> except where indicated in the schedule. Exhibits will be judged for merit but only one cash prize will be awarded to any one exhibitor in any one class. Total points will, however, rank for trophies.
- 3. All exhibits must have been grown in the exhibitor's garden or allotment or must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least two months prior to the date of the show. This rule does not apply to Floral Art.
- 4. The committee reserve the right to refuse any entry and also to inspect any exhibitor's garden or allotment before or after any show.
- 5. The committee will take all possible care of exhibit and vases etc., but accepts no responsibility for loss or damage thereto.
- 6. All vegetables and salad roots should be washed and tops to be cut to approximately three inches, except where otherwise stated. Each entry to consist of one variety only.

Unless otherwise specified, a dish of fruit vegetables or salading must consist of:

3 apples 10 damsons 3 peaches 3 apricots 3 garlic 3 pears 10 blackberries 10 gooseberries 3 plums 2 grapes (bunch) 3 quinces 10 blackcurrant (strigs) 10 loganberries 10 currants red or 10 raspberries white (strigs) 2 melon 10 strawberries 6 broad beans 10 radishes 2 cucumber 6 beans other kinds 3 leeks 3 rhubarb stalks 3 beetroots 2 lettuces 10 shallots 6 brussel sprouts 2 table marrows 2 swedes 2 cabbage 3 onions 3 sweet corn

3 carrots 3 parsnips 3 tomatoes – (5 small fruited)

2 cauliflower 6 peas 3 turnips 2 celery 3 potatoes 3 capsicums

Fruit, vegetables and salading numbers not listed are at the discretion of the Show Committee, who will be pleased to assist.

- 7. All fruits must be shown as grown bearing their natural "bloom" with stalk attached, soft fruit must also have stalks attached. Apples and pears may be shown either ripe or unripe unless otherwise stated in the schedule. DO NOT POLISH APPLES OR PEARS.
- 7a ENTRY FORMS: use only the forms provided with the schedule, further copies are available from the Show Secretary. A SEPARATE FORM MUST BE USED BY EACH EXHIBITOR.

7b. All entry forms must be received by the show secretary any officer or committee member on or before 7pm on the Tuesday preceding the show which will be FREE of charge, children's classes (including late entries) are completely free.

- 7c. A maximum of **ten late exhibits** will be accepted after Tuesday up to 10am on the day of the show but a FEE of 20p per exhibit will be payable. The substitution of late entries will not be permitted. Rule 7c does not apply to Section H (Floral Art) for which NO LATE ENTRIES ACCEPTED.
- 8. STAGING. Exhibits can be staged between 8:30am-10:30am on the day of the show. All exhibits must be staged and rubbish cleared away and the hall vacated by 10:45am. Show tables must not be used for preparation. Separate tables will be provided.
- 9. Exhibitors must provide their own vases, bowls, containers, dishes etc...
- 10. Exhibitors are forbidden to handle/move any exhibits staged by another exhibitor whilst staging their own. If space is needed please seek the help of a show steward.
- 11. Judging will be in accordance with the current standards and specifications of THE ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY and other specialist societies to which this society is affiliated. Any dispute arising there from may be submitted to the respective Society for a decision. An error in naming will not in itself disqualify the exhibit, although it would increase the educational value of the show if exhibits were named.
- 12. The judges decision will be final except in cases where, after an award has been made, the exhibit is found not to be in accordance with the schedule. All matters of protest must be lodged in writing, with the Show Secretary, no later than 3:30pm on the day of the show, with a deposit of £10.00 which will be refunded if the protest is upheld. Exhibits may be cut and or tested at the judges discretion.
- 14. PRIZES- unless otherwise stated will be as follows:

1st prize 60p 6 points 2nd prize 40p 4 points 3rd prize 30p 3 points HC 20p 2 points

- 15. Points to count for special awards and trophies. In the event of a tie for an award IT WILL BE SHARED FOR AN EQUAL PERIOD BY THE EXHIBITORS. The Committee reserve the right to substitute value for cash.
- 16. Cups and trophies are the property of the society and are insured by the society. They must be returned clean and in good condition at least one week before the following year's competition. In cases of trophies awarded for the combined summer and autumn shows the winners must have competed in the appropriate classes at BOTH shows. A trophy won three times (not necessary at consecutive competitions) will entitle the winner to a miniature trophy as a personal possession, after which he/she will not be eligible to win the trophy for at least three years (NB: THIS RULE EXCLUDES TROPHIES WON FOR BEST IN SHOW OR CLASS).

17. CLEARING AWAY No exhibit may be removed before the presentation of prizes has been completed, after which exhibitors will be allowed 15 minutes to clear exhibits required by them. All produce left on the tables after the expiry of this time may be given away or sold by auction for the benefit of the society's funds.

This ruling only applies to horticultural classes unless the entry card is marked RESERVED on its face side by the exhibitor.

18. Entry to all classes is restricted to amateurs. Entries from persons engage professionally, either full or part time in the related activities, will be disqualified. This rule DOES NOT apply to Section H (Floral Art) Classes.

**NOTE:** A copy of the "HORTICULTURAL SHOW HANDBOOK" published by the R.H.S. is available for reference upon application to the Show Secretary. Other reference books, when published and to which this Society is affiliated are available from the General Secretary.

#### **Annual Show Award**

There is only one annual award, The Banksian Medal, and the award is given for the most successful entrant in both the HHS Summer Show and the HHS Autumn Show combined.

The winner is determined by summing the prize money gained at both the HHS Summer and the HHS Autumn Shows excluding Section D and this annual award is presented at the conclusion of the HHS Autumn Show.

The Banksian Medal – is awarded by the ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY to the winner of the largest total amount of prize money in all horticultural classes, at both shows, excluding Section D.

> 5ozs (150g) SR flour, 5ozs (150g) sugar, 5ozs (150g) butter, 3 eggs a little warm water. If required, jam filling.

Judge: Mrs A.M. Collier

METHOD cream butter and sugar until light and creamy in texture. Add eggs a little at a time and beat well, gently fold in the flour. Place mixture into a greased 7" cake tin or two sandwich tins. Bake in moderate oven (325-350F, 160-180C or gas mark 3-4) for 25 to 30 minutes in two tins, 40-45 minutes in one tin. When cool split and fill with jam.

Cream together fat and sugar, beat in eggs one at a time. Add sifted flour, salt and rest of ingredients, mix well and transfer to tin. Smooth top of mixture with a spoon dipped in milk. NB: S.R. flour should not be used. Bake in a moderate oven until the cake is golden and a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Leave in the tin for 5 minutes, turn out on wire rack to cool (cooking time 2 1/2 hours approx Oven 150C, 300F, Gas Mark 2)
